Audrey Bushey: My mind reflected on my dad. He loved to sing songs of Calvary. I'm so glad I received that training. I always had a desire to serve the Lord. He helped me to consecrate my all to Him. Down through the years He has been so good to us and taken care of us. He brought us through COVID. Both my husband and I were very sick. But God would give me scriptures and songs to encourage me. I'm so thankful.

The second special was done by a trio from Englee. Leona, Glenda and Trudy, sang, "Early One Morning at the



Breaking of Dawn." Barbara Randell from Bide Arm sang a solo, "I Owe a Debt I Could not Pay," before the message was given by Pastor Michael Ivany. He used Mark 10:46 as his text in which he explained the story of blind Bartimaeus. Jesus asked him, "What do you want

from me?" Bartimaeus replied, "That I might receive my sight." Jesus gave him his sight that day. That was his expectation when Jesus passed by his way. What is it to have expectations. People get caught up in different worldly expectations. What about spiritual expectations? We are having special meetings.



What are you expecting to receive from them? May we feel stronger when we come away from those meetings and closer to God. Let go of anything that may hinder your blessing and leave it at the feet of Jesus. A wonderful time of prayer followed the message.

Hollis Cull: I went to church one night but had no intention of getting saved. Tears started to flow as conviction weighed heavily upon me. I stayed, counting the cost. But then my tears dried up and I felt my heart harden. I whispered, 'God, please soften my heart' and God did just that. I found myself surrendering. That's 14 years since the Lord saved me! The devil told me I would lose, but he is a liar. It's a step that I haven't regretted.

Rev. Rene Cassell: God looked down in the little isolated community of Hooping Harbor and saw an eight-year-old boy suffering with a terrible skin disease that was going to need a Saviour and a healer. I was that boy and at a young age I would kneel and just weep before the Lord. I felt God in my heart. As a teenager I remember walking home from church, and I would begin to sing, and the Lord would bless me. These experiences helped to establish me in the gospel. I have faced many challenges since, but God's grace has been sufficient to bring me through.

The second special was sung by Booth and Olive from Roddickton, "Let Me Be Worthy." Before the message Bob and Loretta from Englee sang, "He Carried our Sins to Relieve us of the Burden."


Pastor Vanzel Quinlan preached on the "Seven Sayings of Jesus" using different text including Luke 23:32-39, Mark 15:33, St. John 19:28. He explained in depth the last sayings of our Lord, the first one being, "Father, forgive them for they no not what they do." If someone did these terrible things to you as they did to Jesus, what would you do? Jesus showed mercy and love. Both thieves that were on each side of Jesus railed on Him, but one relented. He was the first convert. He said, "Remember me when thou comest into thy kingdom." Luke 23:43 and Jesus said unto him, "Verily I say unto thee, to day shalt thou be with me in paradise." This promise signifies the immediate entry into Heaven. Thank you Lord.

His explanation of all the other sayings really inspired us and impressed upon our hearts to kneel in the presence of the Lord to thank Him for the great sacrifice that He made for our redemption.

# **Easter Sunday**

Praise the Lord, Sunday did come! Resurrection Morning! The choir began with, "Then Came the Dawning." This was a special ordinance service where the saints participated in the observance of the Lord's Supper and Foot Washing. It's always such a blessing to obey Jesus.

Different saints mentioned in testimony that the first thought when they awoke this morning was, "He's Alive!"



There were testimonies of healing, while some are still holding on and believing for a miracle. God is well able to heal! There were short testimonies given, but very much in praise to Jesus for the marvellous things that He has done!

Pastor Randy delivered the first message on the 'Resurrection', and it was powerful! *Matthew 28:6 "He is not here: for he is risen, as he said. Come, see the place where the Lord lay."* Mary Magdalene was in mourning and in the Jewish culture, spices were used to prepare a body for burial. *Mark 16:1* "And when the sabbath was past, Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James, and Salome, had bought sweet spices, that they might come and anoint him." But when they arrived, to their dismay the body of Jesus was gone.

Pastor Randy told of an incident when he was in 6th Grade of how his brother bought him a nice bicycle and it was stolen from school. He cried! Imagine how they felt in the moment, when Jesus' body was gone! Stolen! Grief overwhelmed them. Mary wept when she saw two angels where the body of Jesus lay. "And when she had thus said, she turned herself back, and saw Jesus standing, and knew not that it was Jesus. Jesus saith unto her, Woman, why weepest thou?....Jesus saith unto her, Mary. She turned herself, and saith unto him, Rabboni; which is to say Master." She knew Him!! You are alive! This registered with our hearts very much, as the moment we had recognized Jesus speaking

to us! Pastor Randy concluded with, "I am here to tell you that Jesus is Alive! If not, I would not be here today."

Pastor Eric Compton preached a short message on the Lord's Supper. The key phrase from God's Word during the last supper is, "This do in remembrance of me." 1 Corinthians 11:24,25. Jesus was referring to the partaking of this custom to symbolize His broken body and shed blood, until He comes. In other words, let this remind you of me. We knelt in prayer as the Lord's Supper was served to us. What a beautiful sense of peace and joy as we partook of the emblems representing the blood and body of our Lord. The sweet Holy Spirit filled the atmosphere. Oh, what blessed sweet communion.

Pastor Grant Cassell gave us the message on 'Foot Washing' found in *John 13:4*. This is such an act of humility and obedience. Jesus himself gave the example that we should do likewise, in washing one another's feet. "If ye know these things, happy are ye if ye do them." John 13:17. It was a wonderful morning!

In the evening there was a Baptismal Service! The choir opened with the classic hymn, "The Great Judgement Morning." It was a soul-searching song, giving the audience, especially those not saved, food for thought. All the songs were evangelical and great hymns of The Faith.

Brother David Cassell, one of our ministers from Roddickton, shared his testimony. He has been going through a storm these past months, as his wife has been diagnosed with a terminal illness. He spoke of getting saved at twenty-seven years old, on April 25, 1982. I didn't know how I would fit in. I didn't like anybody in the church, but when I looked around after the Lord saved me, there was nobody to hate. God took all the hatred out of my heart. He quoted a chorus we sing, entitled, "I Know the Master of the Wind." I'm sure this strikes home to him, as he has spent many years before retirement as a commercial fisherman and has witnessed to how God has taken him through many storms and incidents

that were treacherous, while on the open ocean. God can take him

through what he is facing right now! The special songs were beautifully performed with the Holy Spirit blessing them.

Our District Superintendent, Rev. Chris Hewlett gave the message taking his text from Acts 8:26-29. The Ethiopian eunuch was reading from Isaiah. "He was wounded for our transgressions..." This Ethiopian eunuch is a man of authority. He is a very honourable man, but still there was something missing. He continues to search for it. Philip joins him in the chariot as he is reading the scripture. Using Philip, God brings him to a place of spiritual enlightenment. Something prompted you to come out to church tonight. God brought you to remind you of the way to salvation. The eunuch desired that Philip would come sit with him. Maybe it was the first time he heard the gospel message. He accepted it! The eunuch says "See, here is water; what doth hinder me to be baptized?" This is significant because it highlights the importance of faith and belief in Christ as a prerequisite for water baptism. Immediately after he believed, the eunuch wanted to obey the scriptures and be baptized.

There were invitational songs, and several songs regarding following Jesus prior to baptism. Three candidates were baptized, two brothers and a sister. The first one to step out was brother Wilson Hopkins, who had given his heart to the Lord on March 23 at the age of eighty and desires to follow Him. A wonderful service indeed! God is still calling after hearts, let us pray that they will respond to the call!

On January 9th, one of the ladies at our local seniors home gave her heart to the Lord. Bertha Hopkins,

previous to receiving salvation, had been struggling with illness daily. Wilson, her husband who was unsaved at the time, recalls the change that took place. Her pain and unrest turned to praise. and Heaven was now going to be home. It is an awesome blessing to witness, as a church, the power of salvation.

The evening of March 2 a combined service was held at Roddickton with a visiting minister present, brother Wole Ajayi, from Calgary. The image on the screen displayed a Bible verse, "Therefore be ye also ready," Matthew 22:44 together with a statement and a question, "BE READY" and "Are you Ready?"

As the choir sang the beautiful selection, "It Won't be Long," it surely gave pause to all who were able to view the screen. The opening hymns were inviting and there was a special selection by a Roddickton's ladies quartet to open testimonies, entitled, "If it Satisfies you Lord."

He also used a scripture reference from *II Corinthians* 6:2, which advises us to receive salvation now. So, we have the why, how, and when pertaining to seeking the Lord. Brother Wole also used the account of blind Bartimaeus in Mark 10:46-52 to talk of faith and how we should be specific in what we ask of God, to be successful. Stay focused as Bartimaeus did when he stated, "Lord, that I might receive my sight," when asked what he was seeking. Jesus said, "Thy faith hath made thee whole," and immediately Bartimaeus received his sight. Praise the Lord, it's the same formula today.

When God Speaks, It Will Surely Come to Pass

A Father's Testimony of Faith Through Pregnancy Trials

I was raised to understand that everyone born of a woman is born in sin, but thank God Jesus came – not just to forgive sin, but to transform sinners into brand-new creations. He did that for me, beginning a personal relationship with Jesus Christ that has been nurtured and deepened over the years – especially this past one.

About a year ago, I was working offshore on rotation in Luanda, Angola. My wife and daughters were home in Calgary, Canada. I remember the day vividly – my wife called and gently broke the news: a seed had been sown. We were expecting.

I was excited. Our parents loved our two wonderful daughters, ages 10 and 8, but had been hoping – and praying – for another addition. My mother even organized weekly night vigils with my mother-in-law. We all know the power of a mother's prayers!

Upon returning home, we went for a routine ultrasound. That day, it felt like heaven touched earth. We saw our baby and heard the heartbeat. Our hearts overflowed with praise and

thanksgiving to our unfailing God. We began planning how to share the surprise with our mothers – joy was everywhere.

But joy was soon met with a wave of fear.

Just two days later, I noticed my wife looking unusually downcast staring at her phone. Silently, we read the ultrasound report. Concerning markers suggested high risk for Trisomy 18 and 21 – two serious genetic disorders.

Trisomy 21, (Down syndrome) affects development and overall health.

Trisomy 18 (Edwards syndrome) is often life-threatening. My heart sank. We told no one at first and leaned on God's promise in Philippians 1:6: "...that he which hath begun a good work in you will perform it until the day of Jesus Christ."

Following the doctor's advice, my wife underwent an amniocentesis. To test the amniotic fluid for chromosomal abnormalities, a long needle was inserted through the abdomen into the womb. It was painful to watch her endure such an invasive and emotional procedure, but God was in control.

Worse still, during a second trimester ultrasound at South Health Campus Hospital, doctors detected SVT (Supraventricular Tachycardia) – a heart condition causing a dangerously fast fetal heartbeat. Our son's heartbeat was at 220 bpm, nearly double the normal range. It was frightening!

This was an emergency. After hours of monitoring, we were referred to Foothills Medical Center and admitted for three nights. With tear-filled eyes, I drove home to pick up supplies for my wife.

Our pastor visited and prayed with us. The saints in Calgary lifted us in prayer. We stood on God's promise in Isaiah 66:9, "Shall I bring to the birth, and not cause to bring forth? saith the Lord..."

As a husband and expectant father often away from home, my faith was tested. But through it all, we chose to hold on to God's Word. We chose faith over fear. God had already spoken life over this child, and we believed Him.

Through tearful, anxious nights and difficult decisions, we had peace. The situation was real – but God's presence was even more real! The doctors spoke facts, but we clung to the truth of God's promises. He strengthened and comforted us. We were surrounded by the prayers of family and friends – especially the ceaseless intercession of two faith-believing grandparents.

Today, June 1, 2025, we stand in awe.



We dedicate our son to the Lord. He was born strong, healthy, and full of life. The tests came back clear. His heart beats normally! Everything the enemy meant for evil, God turned around for good.

Maybe you are in a season of waiting. Maybe you have received a fearful report. Hold on to God. His Word never

fails. What He has spoken, He will do. He is not a man that He should lie. To God alone be all the glory. Amen.

Pastor Marjorie offered the closing prayer.


# **Langley Hosted Four Visiting Ministers from the United States**
